



**NILES DISCOVERY CHURCH CELEBRATES FIFTH ANNIVERSARY**

The congregation gathered to celebrate our fifth anniversary with worship and singing and food on Sunday, September 10. The UCC Northern California-Nevada Conference Minister, the Rev. Diane Weible, preached on being “Like a Monkeypod,” a large tree with a spreading canopy that grows in Hawai’i, providing shelter and nourishment for everything growing in its shade.

The worship theme was “Planted by the water ... for the healing of the nations,” a reference to the scripture reading for the day, Revelation 22:1-6. The choir, on their first Sunday back for the program year, offered three joyful anthems.

After worship, the celebration continued with lunch provided by a taco truck, live music in the fellowship hall, outdoor games for the kids, and art projects for all ages. The art project, creating a tree with leaves “for the healing of the nations” (a reference to the Revelation reading), will be on display into October.



A special part of the celebration was the unveiling of our new plaque, which was commissioned and installed by John Hollowell. Situated under the bell on the patio,

## Jeff's Jottings

### WHY DO YOU GIVE MONEY TO THE CHURCH?

I suppose there are lots of reasons out there, maybe as many as there are people giving money. I suspect all of those reasons fall into one of these categories: Some people give out of a sense of habit. Some people give out of a sense of obligation. Some people give to keep the institution alive. Some people give out of a sense of guilt (I wish I could figure out a way to stop this one). Some people give because they see it as a way to act like Jesus. Some people give to create a sense of investment in the church and what it stands for. And some people give to further the mission of the church.



I was going to say that I give to the church for the last two of these reasons, but if I'm honest with myself, I also give out of a sense of obligation. The church is important to me and so I feel an obligation to contribute to keep it going. I don't know how spiritually healthy that is, but it is honestly one of the reasons I make a pledge each year to support the church financially.

I also give in part to connect myself more deeply with the church. I

know I spend money on the things that matter to me (food, for instance), so giving to the church makes me feel more invested in the church. But the most important reason I give is that I care about what our church is doing.

Following the example of Jesus, Niles Discovery Church welcomes all people, grows in our relationship with God and each other, and serves our neighbors near and far.

That is how we have articulated our mission as a church. That is how we have said we embody and carry the great commandments—to love God with our whole being and to love our neighbors as ourselves. We tend to think of love as a feeling, a feeling connected to romance. But love (at least as I understand these commandments) is a decision to act, to act for the good of another person or the community. Love is an action that asserts the worth of the other. In some cases, the actions of love—actions for the good of others—may be motivated by tenderness and compassion. In all cases, the actions of love are centered in a choice, a sometimes painful choice, to act for the ultimate benefit of other individuals and the community.

We've said that Niles Discovery Church carries out this love by

choosing to welcome all people (and "all" really does mean all), to grow in our relationships with God and each other, and to find opportunities for service to our fellow human beings.

Jesus demonstrated this kind of love, a generous overflowing love. And he calls us, his disciples, to love in the same way—with generous, overflowing love. Which gets us to the theme of this year's pledge campaign: The Generous Way of Jesus. The invitation of this pledge campaign is to choose, as stewards of the resources we have access to in our lives, to use them to be more generous with our love as lived out in the mission and ministry of Niles Discovery Church.

In the coming weeks, you'll hear sermons and testimonies about the Generous Way of Jesus. You'll receive letters and emails about the Generous Way of Jesus. And you will be invited to make a financial pledge of support of the mission of our church in 2018 that we hope will draw you more deeply into the Generous Way of Jesus. I hope you will join us on this journey.

### STRATEGIC PLAN PROGRESS

Goal One: Start at least two our intergenerational, multicultural, hands-on mission and service each year. Three of our Goal One projects have had significant progress in the last month:

The Pathways to the Beloved Community project (formerly known as Building Beloved Community Through Reconciliation) held an organizational meeting on Sept. 17th. The group will be focusing on two types of activities to break down the "them vs. us" barrier: (1) anti-racism training (in connection with the regional DOC), and (2) "pop-up" events using the arts to educate and express ourselves. Our neighbors in the wider Fremont-Union City-Newark area will be invited to these events. It's not too late to join this project: get in touch with Joy Barnitz (jbarnitz@nilesdiscoverychurch.org).

The Mobile Food Van project expects to begin operations early this month. On Sunday, September 17, the steering team met with interested volunteers after worship for a training session. Steering Team



Leaders John Zlatnik, Marilyn Singer, and Michele McConville led the training, and Tri-City Volunteers' Executive Director, Taylor Johnson, was present to answer questions. The project volunteers have now been formed into work teams and hope to begin delivering food in October.

The Habitat for Humanity project is also progressing, although much of the work is being done in the background at this point. Project volunteer Barb King is one of those who is on the Family Selection Committee and has been interviewing prospective families to receive housing. Habitat's volunteer coordinator tells us they have been overwhelmed with volunteers and are working to add additional work days and volunteer opportunities. If you are interested in participating in this project, watch the announcements for a project meeting happening later this month.

Continue to watch this place for future updates on all our strategic plan projects and goal progress.

## NEW GLASS IN DOORS INCREASES CHILD SAFETY

Thanks to the craftsmanship of John Hollowell, there are now glass panes in the doors between Rooms 3 and 4. "The goal is to allow a teacher or program leader, in either room, be an extra set of eyes for the other room," Pastor Jeff explained. "We really think this will enhance the safety of our children." The congregation's "Safe Church Policies" call for there to be two adults present when working with younger children. The glass in the doors now means that an adult in one room working with one set of children can be the second adult for the person working with children in the other room.

Many, many thanks to John for making this modification to our doors, and increasing safety and program flexibility.

## SECOND SATURDAY DOCUMENTARY SERIES

### "AFTER SPRING" DOCUMENTS STRUGGLES OF SYRIAN REFUGEES, AID WORKERS

Tents stretch as far as the eye can see on a dusty plain in Zaatari, Jordan, the largest of the camps for Syrian refugees.

"After Spring," the October *Second Saturday Documentary Series* offering, follows two refugee families striving to preserve their dignity and the aid workers struggling to keep the sprawling camp operational. The free film will be shown October 14 at 1:30 p.m. at Niles Discovery Church.

The 80,000 residents of Zaatari, the fourth largest "city" in Jordan, are improvising ways to avoid despair in what is now the sixth year of the Syrian war. Director Ellen Martinez and Executive Producer Jon Stewart point out in the film that more than half the camp's population is under the age of 18. More than 5,000 babies have been born since the camp opened in July 2012.

After the screening, a moderated discussion will be led by Janah Kadah, a Syrian-American student who recently returned from visiting refugee camps in Greece, Italy and Lebanon.


