

Pledge Sunday is November 2



NDC FINANCIAL SUMMARY YEAR TO DATE THROUGH SEPTEMBER 2025

Through the third quarter of 2025, income exceeded budget and expenses were less, resulting in a surplus rather than a projected budget deficit.

Income is up across all budgeted categories.

Pledges have been up throughout the year. After a great start, primarily due to prepaid pledges, September reversed a trend of under budget pledge income from the previous four months. Through the end of the third quarter, 19 pledgers have paid their entire yearly pledge in full, some significantly more. Another 28 pledgers have paid between 75% and 99% of their annual pledges. There are 21 pledgers that have paid under 75% of their pledges.

Actual \$6,731 Surplus Expenses are down slightly across most budget categories, led by staffing and Cabinet/Ministries.

The result is a slight surplus instead of a significant deficit.



CASH RESERVE INVESTMENT FUNDS BALANCES

The reserve fund balance increased significantly during the 3rd quarter due to market performance. All three months showed market gains. In addition, because we are currently running a surplus operating budget and have sufficient cash reserves in our money market account, we have not had to withdraw any funds from our investments to cover the deficit we anticipated in our budget.

Fair warning: The Finance Committee expects continued significant market volatility in the short to medium term. As a reminder, past performance is not an indicator or guarantee of future results.

Summary

Overall, we have done very well in the first three quarters of the year. However, the budget surplus turned into a deficit in July and August. A really good September, with pledges recovering and a highly successful flea market, returned us to a small surplus. If we can continue to follow through with our pledges and loose offering continues to exceed expectations, we will end the year in a much better financial condition than we had anticipated in January.



A SERVICE AFTER THE MANNER OF THE PILGRIMS

For better or worse, our national mythology connects our contemporary celebrations of

Thanksgiving with a 1621 event in Plymouth, New England. Historians will tell you that we know very little about that event. Edward Winslow. one of the



These Pilgrim immigrants were Separatists. They (and Puritans who remained in Great Britain) felt the Church of England was not embodying what it means to be a Christian, and so they separated. The Pilgrims left Great Britain to

come to the Americas to establish a colony that would be purified of the failings of the Church of England.



Puritans did their purifying, at least at first, in England.

Some Puritans soon left Great Britain to ioin their Pilgrim theological cousins Massachusetts Bay colony. It was out of these groups that the Congregationalists emerged. It was out of the Congregationalists and several other denominations that the United Church of Christ emerged. Thus, we can claim an especially deep theological national connection to the mythology and celebrations of Thanksgiving.

Bearing all this in mind, we are going to have an experimental worship service on November 23. That is, experimental for us. My hope is to create a service after the manner of our Pilgrim forebears. Be assured that "after the manner" does not include the service taking all morning.

As the deadline for this edition of

The Bell approaches, I'm still kicking around specific ideas for our worship service on that Sunday before Thanksgiving. I have a manuscript of a sermon preached in Plymouth in 1621 (it will need to be edited for length, and I need to decide whether or not to modernize the English). We still need to figure out how we will include music in the service. The early Congregationalists said that the use of musical instruments was the "work of the devil." It wasn't until around 1700 that stringed instruments came into use in worship, and the first organ wasn't installed in a Boston meeting house until 1713 (which, coincidentally, is the year Lexington, Massachusetts, was incorporated).

I hope as many of you as possible will worship on site that Sunday. The beginning of the service will happen outside the sanctuary, and I'm not sure how that will work, if at all, on Zoom. You are welcome to come in period dress, though that is certainly not required. And, fear not, for we will not be giving "censures," as officers of the church did in the 17th century, calling attention to the failures of individuals to conduct themselves in a manner that measured up to expected standards.

I hope we can make this service worshipful, educational, and a fun (even if our Pilgrim and Puritan forebears would have frowned on the "fun").





FIGURING OUT WHAT IT COSTS TO RUN MY CAR

In preparation for the EV Car Show we held on Sun Day, September 21, I did a little calculation on how much I spend on fuel to power my electric car compared to the fuel costs for a gasoline powered car. Because my car has an onboard computer that calculates my mileage, this wasn't very hard to do.

We're all familiar with the "miles per gallon" rating gasoline cars get. With an electric car, the rating is "miles per kilowatt hour." The computer in my car says that I'm averaging 4.7 miles per kilowatt hour.

Eva Energy's "Renewal 100" (100% renewable energy) EV2-AL electric vehicle rate plan averages (generation plus delivery) \$0.23161 per kWh. At 4.7 mpKwh, that's an energy cost of just under \$0.05/mile.



However, we have solar on the parsonage roof that generates more electricity than I use each year, even with charging my car at home. So, my energy cost to drive my car is typically \$0.00/mile – you can't beat that!

On road trips, when I have to charge my car at a "fast charger," the most I've paid is around \$0.60 per kWh, which comes out to just under \$0.13/mile.

If your gasoline powered car is getting 30mpg and gasoline is \$5.00/gal, your energy costs are \$0.1667/mile.

On October 8, *The New York Times* ran an article about the costs of fueling a car, an exercise very similar to the one I did. Their calculator came up with very similar results (see the large bar graph).

Another cost for cars is maintenance, and maintenance on my EV is next to nothing. In the 5 years I've owned the car, I've paid for new wipers, new tires, a new 12-volt battery (the battery that runs the computer to start your car), and windshield wiper fluid. Tires on an EV do wear out a little faster and can be a little more expensive, compared to a gasoline-powered car.



SUN DAY WRAP-UP



Niles Discovery Church held two Sun Day events: "Our Solar Story" on Saturday, September 20, and an "EV Car Show" on Sunday, September 21. This led to Niles Discovery Church being named a "Sunbeam Congregation" by Third Act.

"Our Solar Story" was a presentation on how Niles Discovery Church paid for the solar PV system we installed on our sanctuary roof nine years ago, how it's worked for us, what its financial impact has been (paid for itself in around 6 years and is now paying a \$15k dividend in non-existent electric bills), and what we hope our

next steps will be (batteries). There were lots of questions following Bill Palleschi's presentation from people representing at least four other faith communities from the area.

The "EV Car Show" showed off over a dozen EVs (and one plug-in hybrid) owned by church members and a couple of friends. Our goal was to let our neighbors check out the cars and ask the owners questions before they consider buying an EV for themselves. Even though we are in Fremont, California, only two of the EVs on display were Teslas. In addition to showing off the EVs, we had art projects and snacks for everyone. We didn't get quite as much foot traffic as the Green Team had hoped, but it was *fun*!

the figurines in this crèche that have survived those years is fragile – the donkey is missing a leg and needs to lean against the stable wall. As I think about the lives of the characters we read about in the birth narratives of Jesus, I realize that their lives were fragile, too. The promise of Jesus, embodied in the baby whose birth we celebrate, is the promise that God is with us in our fragility, just as we are with each other.

Advent is usually about waiting. But we cannot wait to have hope; it is essential now. We cannot wait to

work for peace; lives are at stake now. We cannot wait to embrace joy, even and especially when it seems in short supply. We cannot wait to love, most of all, because we are the ones who follow the saving love of Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us.



LEAN CANVAS SPECIAL MINISTRY TEAM

If you remember a Town Hall meeting last year, when we all put little post-it dots all around the Fellowship Hall with our preferences for the future image and growth of our church. I can tell you that the Lean Canvas* Special Ministry Team has been working on your suggestions. The team members are Mary Von-Ah Gregory, Judy Zlatnik, Leonard Lloyd, Ron Adamson, Melissa Palleschi, and me. The primary concern of the congregation was making our image as a church clear in our Community. The team has focused on 4 projects to do this.

Website - Bill Palleschi and Taylor Johnson are actively working on updating our website. They want to make it welcoming, easy to navigate, and simple to update.

Signage - A large banner was created and hung on the street side of the building, welcoming everyone. After much effort and research, the Lean Canvas Team has provided the details of their investigations into updating our outdoor sign with a digital programmable sign and has forwarded it to the Ministry of Property Team. This expensive project will require city approval and permitting, and underground electrical work. In the meantime, the team is going to work on cleaning and updating our current sign.

Welcome Flyers - outside 'mail' boxes. There are two small, clear plastic mailboxes outside the building holding a 3.5" x 8.5" welcome flyer. They inform passers-by about who we are and what we stand for, along with the times of our services. One is attached to our monument sign's wooden post, and the other is near the street-side patio gate. The original 30 'flyers' have been taken by passersby and replaced with reprints.

Family Friendly - The outdoor playground has been tabled as the attendance of young families has slowed.

The Jesus Seminar

The Jesus Seminar was a group of biblical scholars founded by Robert Funk in 1985 to explore the historicity of the deeds and sayings of Jesus. We now have two of the major publications that emerged from this long-term study:

- Funk, Robert et al. The Five Gospels: The Search for the Authentic Words of Jesus (1993)
- Funk, Robert et al. The Acts of Jesus: The Search for the Authentic Deeds of Jesus (1998)

Environmental and social justice

These are two broad subject areas in which we try to
